

Levelling the Playing Field:

Behaviour, Boundaries and Belonging
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- Children's behaviour is highly related to their home environment
- Behaviour is learned from these environments
- Behaviour is teachable- the Behaviour Curriculum.
- Good behaviour is fundamental to all success outcomes for children
- Teachers must create the culture
- Culture is built out of habits, norms, and consequences.



Beginning a new class

- BEFORE: decide your routines, norms and boundaries
- PREPARE your classroom thoroughly. Be there first!
- GREET every student with eye contact
- DIRECT them to a seat by name
- FRAME the relationship
- TEACH the behaviour expectations
- PRACTISE the behaviour
- ASSESS their understanding.
- MAINTAIN boundaries
- RECAP learning

This should take the entire lesson.

So what are we aiming for in the classroom?

The teacher/ student relationship is where:

- Students know how WE will behave towards them and THEY know what we expect of them

Demonstrating HIGH REGARD and CARE





RELATIONSHIPS AND BOUNDARIES

Every relationship needs boundaries

Children who never hear no, never learn to value others' needs

Boundaries need consequences

Deferred gratification

'I can do as I please...'





Belonging

- Identifying with a group raises the motivation to conform to the norms of the group
- Group goals become personal goals
- Reluctance to avoid social penalties acts as a deterrent
- Conformity and non conformity
